Putting plans into action with community support

Seeking to put God's love into action, Habitat for Humanity brings people together to build homes, communities, and hope.

Inside, meet our 2023 families and the riders who will bike 500 kilometers this July to raise money and awareness for Habitat!

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Spring and early summer are exciting times of the year at North St. Louis County Habitat for Humanity! As an ecumenical Christian housing ministry, we work to fulfil our mission of displaying God's love by bringing people together to build homes, communities, and hope.

That work takes effort and careful planning. We are blessed with a dedicated board of directors who provide thoughtful support and strategic leadership to the organization. This

spring, the board held a special planning session to outline our

direction for the 2023 construction season. Our goal is to partner with at least five families to give them the opportunity to build and affordably buy a home. Right now, we are finished with homes started in 2022 in Chisholm and Virginia, and others in Hibbing and Buhl are nearing completion.

Home projects are started in Eveleth (three), and two more are planned in Hibbing. Each year, we match families in need of homes with available lots, funding sources, and volunteer availability. We also consider the needs across the Iron Range and work diligently to provide affordable homes across our service area. This year, we will be blessed to have built with 116 households in 15 communities!

The need for affordable housing is critical in our area. Many of our lower-income neighbors experience the cost burden of paying much more than 30% of their income for apartments that are often inadequate, unsafe, and dilapidated. Housing has become a first-tier issue in the Minnesota Legislature, and we were blessed with the state allocating significant funding to help affordable housing efforts. This funding is a blessing but will not address the significant housing shortage alone. As always, we are blessed with your support for the work that we do with our neighbors in need. Thank you!

As we seek to grow our ability to serve North St. Louis County, the planning session identified three primary challenges: funding, staffing, and advocacy. Growing all our funding pools is essential for serving more families while keeping up with the increased costs of materials, land, and professional labor. Our organization is blessed with capable, dedicated staff, and we will look to sustainably add another staff person as seed to increase the number of homes we build. Finally, we cannot reach our vision of a world where everyone has a decent place to live by hands on hammers alone. We need the community at large to be involved in sharing the urgency of the affordable housing need with all agencies, governments, businesses, and individuals.

All plans are just dreams if there is no discipline to put them into action. We are thankful for you, our volunteers and supporters, who help us every day in fulfilling Habitat's mission. We also approach our plans prayerfully, acknowledging God's blessing in our work. Together, we continue to make a difference!

Do you or someone you know need affordable housing? We can help! We accept applications year-round. Interested families (individuals or multiple people) can call and request an application packet, pick one up, or complete the Applicant Inquiry Form on our website. When an application is submitted, the first step is to calculate income and compare it to our guidelines. All other information submitted goes through a process that includes employment verification, landlord references, bank account deposits, credit checks, and background checks. We are looking to meet three basic criteria:

- **Need for housing:** What is your current living situation? Is it unsafe? Inadequate? Overcrowded? Are your heating costs or rent too high compared to your income?
- Ability to pay: Do you have a stable source of income of at least \$26,000 per year that does not exceed 60% of the area's median income? Is your debt manageable? Do you have responsible credit with manageable debt?
- Willingness to partner: Are you willing to build a home with us? Are you willing to volunteer to build other partner families' homes? Are you willing to attend homeownership classes?



Our homes are one level and built on a heated slab on lots with existing city water and sewer. The number of bedrooms is determined by family size. Our service

area covers the northern half of St. Louis County, Minnesota, from the communities of Orr to Cotton and Hoyt Lakes to Hibbing.

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Bike.Build.Home 500: A new tradition hits the road

Bicyclists from our area are pedaling for a cause July 12 – 16 to support affordable homeownership in North St. Louis County. The Bike.Build.Home 500, like the former Habitat 500 bike ride, supports affordable housing while building community and camaraderie. Riders work with a peer network to raise at least \$1,000 for their chosen affordable housing organization and ride 500 kilometers in Minnesota, Wisconsin, and Iowa. The money raised raise by local riders will help us partner this year with two families in Hibbing and three in Eveleth.



An all-volunteer committee aims to continue the traditions of the Habitat 500, formerly coordinated by Habitat for Humanity of Minnesota, which raised more than \$7 million over 30 years. This year's Bike.Build.Home 500 is hosted by Habitat for Humanity La Crosse Area.

If you're up for this fun, non-competitive challenge, there is still time to join longtime Habitat 500 participants by riding in the virtual challenge, meaning the miles are real, but the route is your own. In 2005, I took up the challenge to ride a bicycle 500 miles to raise awareness of the need for affordable housing in north St. Louis County. More than once I asked myself, "Why am I doing this?" It was a good way, though, to bring attention to Habitat for Humanity and to let people know that we were serious about our mission to build simple, decent, affordable housing for families in need.



After 27 years of volunteering with our North St. Louis County affiliate and after 17 years of riding in the Habitat 500, I still feel strongly about this mission. My wife, Christy, and I planned on getting on our bikes on July 12 and riding once again to raise money and awareness for affordable housing in northern St. Louis County. Unfortunately, an injury has prevented me from riding for quite a while. from my house in Tower to the Eagles Nest fire hall and back, and I'll have to do that 20 times. People sometimes ask me why I do it. The main thing is I believe in the mission of Habitat for Humanity, and I like riding my bike.

Hibbing High School partnership

Lynnette Nowak's house is the latest Habitat home built through a partnership that began in 2008 with the Applied Learning Institute, Hibbing High School, Minnesota North College-Hibbing's Electrical Maintenance program. Local students have the unique opportunity to experience nearly every aspect of home construction! Hibbing High School students in AJ Abate's Building Construction II course were on site throughout the school year. Nearly 30 Minnesota North College-Hibbing students led by instructor Steve Oberstar installed the home's wiring.

This partnership gives back to the community, show students career opportunities, and gives real-world

experience that can be used on the job or in their own home. Mr. Abate said, "They pulled it together. It has exceeded my expectations." Lynnette called the Bluejacket builders "absolute rockstars" and frequently brought them water and treats. The biggest takeaway is the students' confidence in knowing they can build a home. They have fun while still learning valuable skills!

Habitat on the Hill

Habitat on the Hill is an annual nonpartisan advocacy event hosted by Habitat for Humanity of Minnesota and Twin Cities Habitat. On April 25, staff, board members, volunteers, and homeowners from across the state gathered at the Capitol in St. Paul to speak with elected officials and to support housing legislation.

NSLCHFH staff spoke with Rep. Spencer Igo, Rep. Dave Lislegard, Rep. Roger Skraba, and Sen. Robert Farnsworth and explained how their votes could help make housing more accessible and affordable for more Minnesotans.
